Several readers responded to the back page photo (below) that appeared in the September 2012 issue of *Flightline*, asking if it was the briefing room. Here are the comments and additional information that we received:

Photo is indeed the "bomb run" room. I sat in it 13 times for our pre-flight info for the target of the day. Usually started at 4 a.m. I was navigator for my crew. These days officially "Lloyd E. Jensen, 1st Lt Retired USAF." Retirement was result of serious injury from flak on my 13th bomb run. As I recall it was counted as my 22<sup>nd</sup> mission since we got double count on most of them. Ripe old age of 19 thru all of this, with official retirement at 21 in February 1946 at the end of my terminal leave while a freshman engineering student at Iowa State College - now called Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa.

Greatly appreciate your efforts with Flightline.


#### Kathy,

I would like to pass along some comments in response to your question in the September 2012 Flightline regarding the photo of a Briefing Room.

I was in the B/R for each of the 35 missions I flew between August '44 and March '45. That photo sure looks like a B/R but not as I recall the 780<sup>th</sup> B/R.

Our B/R was quite similar to the photo. It was in a wine cellar just like that shown in the photo, Access was via a concrete staircase (from ground level), that hugged the wall on the right. No stairway is shown in the photo, unless it is behind the camera. The 780th B/R did not have 170

"chairs" so precisely aligned. I recall we had benches. Maybe life got more comfortable as VE-Day

## Leaving Pantanella for the Last Time

fter D-Day, I saw a sign saying that anyone who was a staff sergeant or above could be commissioned into the infantry as a second lieutenant. That was because so many second lieutenants were being killed in the ground war. When I saw that sign, I said to my friend, "Who would do that?" Every time we flew over the front lines and would see the men dug into fox holes in the snow, we would think, "We get to go home and sleep in our beds tonight."

The war in Europe ended 8 May 1945. On 12 May 1945 the surrender was signed. On 13 May, all of us at Pantanella took all of our clothes

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at the top of the previous page has two photos of the briefing room with a description underneath. The description says:

Above photos show periods of construction required to convert an underground hay barn into an Intelligence Briefing Room and office. An estimated 350 tons of hay which had burned to ash 4 feet high x 130 x 20 was removed by means of narrow guage and dump truck operated by a winch on a 2 1/2 ton army truck. This work was accomplished by the officers and the enlisted men of the Intelligence Section.

(Editor's note: Not only am I impressed with the amount of hay ash that had to be removed, but that officers got involved in the dirty work! Thank you for the responses. (except for one pair of khakis and one pair of fatigues) and threw them in a pile along with all our other possessions. We could keep the German and Italian field pick-up weapons as souvenirs. I got six new khaki pants and shirts and six .45s and six .45 ammo boxes from the pile of stuff that the other men had dumped into the pile. I smuggled this stuff into a plane and hid it. Also in that cache was my collection of .50 caliber bullets, one for each mission I flew with the date of the mission written on it.

When we arrived in the states, we would be allowed to carry one small bag off the plane; everything else was thrown away and we got a new bag and new clothes. That last night in Pantanella, W. B. Newton (the waist gunner) and I went back to the plane to retrieve our contraband supplies, but we discovered that the plane had already departed for Arizona to be stored. I guess that stuff is still in the plane, wherever it is.

On 14 May, we left Pantanella, heading back to the states. We flew our own plane to Hunter Field in Savannah, Georgia. It took us twelve days to return home because the plane developed engine trouble in Rio de Janeiro. We got back around 26 May. Then we had a 30-day furlough to go home.
