



Recollections of a Tail Gunner

Whenever we dropped bombs on a heavily guarded target, I would look back to observe the other bombers as they poked their noses out of the huge black cloud of flak smoke. On the way home, all crew members watched for stragglers, and we later reported any planes shot down, or parachutes seen in an interrogation session.

On a trip to attack the Osterreiche Saurerwerke-Dieseleng Factory at Vienna, Austria, flying in 'Guardian Angel' with Lt. Jim Althoff and Ernie Van Asperen as pilots, we lost #4 engine as we approached Lake Balaton, Hungary.

That huge lake is about fifty miles long, and the Germans had fighter plane bases there. With a feathered prop and being unable to keep up with the formation, the pilots asked us crewmen should we continue alone or turn around and return to Italy as an early return and a mission not counted? The consensus was to return to Italy. We were deep into enemy territory,

and alone.

All eyes were on the alert searching for enemy fighters who might see us, and pounce on us for the kill.


There is nothing more lonely than flying in a disabled aircraft, as a 'sitting duck' over enemy territory.

I stared through the plexi-glass canopy of my turret. The sunlight was blinding, even though I wore

sun glasses, so I would blink my eyes then study the sky again.

There it was-a speck in the distance- or was it a piece of dirt on the plexi-glass? When it moved, I called the crew, and got the plane in my gun sight.

The top gunner, Sgt. Henry E. Black, said he had also found the plane. The speck grew larger very fast. Then the

plane suddenly banked, and we recognized it as a P-51 Mustang.

It was 'THISIZIT' from the 325th. Fighter Group, the 'Checker-tails'.

The P-51 pilot escorted us back to friendly territory.

We were happy that he had come along.




MacDill AF Base...

Flying operations at MacDill began in 1941 with the base's first mission including transitional training in the B-17 Flying Fortress. Following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, MacDill became a major staging area for Army Air Corps flight crews and aircraft.

During the war as many as 15,000 troops were stationed at MacDill at one time. Estimates of the number of crew members trained at the base vary from 50,000 to 120,000.

In 1996 the Air Refueling Wing marked the beginning of a new era for MacDill. The redesignation marked the addition of a KC-135R squadron and mission which expanded in 1997 with the add-on of EC-135 and CT-43 aircraft and missions.

Since the redesignation, MacDill and the 6th Air Refueling Wing, have contributed to military operations around the world at locations including Istres, France; Ramstein AB, Germany; Soto Cano and Taszar, Hungary; Zagreb, Croatia; Tuzla, Bosnia; Incirlik AB, Turkey; and Al Kharj and Riyadh, Saudia Arabia.

Re-Live Your 'SS Asa Gray' Experience of '44 On the 'Off Day' In Tampa

Victory and Liberty ships were crewed by members of the U.S. Merchant Marine and defended by an all-volunteer group of U.S. Navy sailors called the Navy Armed Guard. The operation of these ships during World War II came at great human cost:

The Merchant Marine suffered more loss of life, by percentage of their ranks, than any other branch of service; the Armed Guard lost thousands. US Merchant Mariners and the Navy Armed Guard are truly the forgotten heroes of WW II.

The SS American Victory, a 1945 vintage merchant ship which served during World War II, and the Korean and Vietnam wars as a military cargo, is being transformed into a carrier world-class museum, mariners and memorial and a "ReLive History" cruising ship.

The popular American Victory Restoration Tour allow visitors to view firsthand the on-going work

to restore this icon of America's merchant maritime might, a functioning, 1940s-era merchant cargo vessel which served during World War II and the Korean and Vietnam wars.

SS American Victory was named after American University in Washington, D.C., to honor the school's contributions to war training and weapons research during both WW I and WW II. From June until September 1945, she carried ammunition and other cargo from U.S. West Coast ports to Southeast Asia. She ferried cargo, equipment and troops back to the U.S. after the war ended.

Visitors experience virtually the entire ship, including cavernous three level cargo holds, radio and gyro rooms, hospital, galley,

weaponry, reefers, steering stations, flying bridge, signaling equipment, wheelhouse, officer and crew messes, engine room, crew cabins, chartroom, lifeboats and cargo equipment.

The developing museum contains photographs of the American Victory and other period merchant ships, U.S. Merchant Marine uniforms, medals and documents, personal recollections of life at sea as well as navigational equipment, hands-on displays and weaponry.

Keep 'Em Flying


The target for 5 February was the Winterhafen Oil Storage Depot at Regensburg, Germany.

Pathfinder methods of bombing were used and poor results were achieved. Crews piloted by Lts. McDaniel, Hudson, Wilcox, Mullan, Barnett, Hewitt, Hendrickson and Jones took part with the latter failing to return.

Lt. Jones's aircraft (Yellow H) was last seen falling behind the formation as it left the coast of Italy en route over the Adriatic Sea to Base. The plane did not appear to be in any trouble.

Members of the missing Crew were: 2nd Lt. Robert C. Jones, Pilot; 2nd Lt. William I. Dobbs, Co-Pilot; 2nd Lt. Arthur Silver, Navigator; 2nd Lt. Joseph E. Ormes, Bombardier; Cpl. Howard M. Fox, Engineer; Cpl. Charles H. Duffield, RIO; Cpl. Roscoe E. Fee, Gunner; Cpl. Carrol E. Elmore, Gunner; Cpl. Bernard J. Reardon, Gunner; and Cpl. Vernon M. Ellsworth, Gunner.

On the return leg of the mission and after leaving the coast of Yugoslavia Jones was heard to call Able One but he did not get a response. He then called Easy One and reported that he had only 270 gallons of fuel left. He indicated that he was going to try to make the coast of Italy and Easy One advised Jones to call Big Fence for a heading. Big Fence replied and gave Jones a heading of 165 degrees to Ancona. Jones advised Big Fence that he did not have very much fuel and wanted to know the weather at Ancona. He was told that it was 100 feet. Jones then advised Big Fence that he was heading 165 degrees. No further transmissions were heard from Jones and no one reported seeing the aircraft again. It was assumed that they ditched not long after the last radio message and that all men were lost.

Son of 783rd Navigator Publishes His Fathers' Exploits in New Book


A new book, "**Destination Vienna**", written about a 783rd Navigator, has just been published.

Kevin W. Edwards, the son of the late William W. Edwards, a former 2nd Lieutenant/Navigator who served in World War II with the 783rd Squadron of the 465th Bomb Group, has written a book about the 15th Army Air Corp. centering on his father's experience as a Navigator with the 783rd.

He joined the ranks of the Folded Wings quietly at home on 31 December 2009 following a short but severe illness. He will be interred at Great Lakes National Cemetery, Holly MI at 1330hrs on 5 January 2010.

He was a very proud member of the 465th Bomb Group, 781st Bomb Squadron stationed at Pantanella Airfield, he was one the un-assigned co-pilots that crewed in many of the 781st's B-24's. The one he often specifically spoke about often was the Guardian Angel, which finally went down in the Adriatic, but according to him refused to sink for days after...

I will never being forget regaled as a child of all of the 781st's exploits, most specifically cruising around the base when the unit was in North Africa in captured German armored vehicles and motorbikes equisitioned" from the brits by trading some of their "firewater" ration, and of the numerous missions over the Ploesti Oilfields.

I want to thank you for doing your part to immortalize these men of the "Greatest Generation"!


