GOOD BYE INDEPENDENCE, MO IT'S TAMPA, FL IN 2010



781st Bomb Squadron Association members pose for a "Kodak Moment" in front of the Harry S. Truman Presidential Library and Juseum in Independence MO.

The facility was the first presidential library to be created under the provisions of the 1955 Presidential Libraries Act, and is one of twelve presidential libraries administered by the National Archives and Records Administration.

From the time the Library opened, President Truman maintained a working office there, often working five or six days a week. The office appears today just as it did when Harry Truman died on December 26, 1972.



onded by Earl Leinart. President Orren Lee asked for a show of hands. 8 in favor.



The Reunion... As I recall it-

I departed on Sunday October 4th., around 8:30 in the morning, from my home in Gloversville, New York for a one and one half hour drive to the airport in Albany, NY.

Lt. Col. Edwin Redman, an Air Force Academy raduate and 15-year veteran of the Air Force, had flown B-52s and B-1 bombers before graduating to the B-2. He related his experience of leading

a massive flight of American bombers against targets near

Baghdad.

Of great interest to most of us was the tremendous amount of assets the B-2 could carry with only a crew of two, where as the 24's we flew in carried 10, that is unless there was a photographer along, and then of course, if my math is correct, there would be 11. In our 465th BG there would be at least one B-24 carrying a photographer on each mission flown.

rollowing the briefing, Redman and his aides escorted our group to the flight line describing the B-2 on a one to one basis with anyone that would inquire.


REPORT FROM STRATEGIC AIR and SPACE MUSEUM

Earl Leinart's 'Last Man Standing' Toast

At the conclusion of the 781st BS Association business meeting, Board member, Earl Leinart proposed the following toast to the all the 781st veterans attending and to all other 81st. Vets still living, where ever they are and to all those that have sacrificed their lives and have Folded their Wings before us.

Gentlemen of the 781st Heavy Bomb Squad, I stand before you to propose a toast to the 19 men present who are left standing after over 64 years since last we flew and fought together out of Italy in 1944 & 1945.

You flew, and you supported those who flew. You responded to your country's call to arms, you endured cold, long hours or boredom, frightful AA fire (flak), damage to aircraft, mechanical failure, weather, capture by the enemy and an almost endless list of dangers. "Climbing through cloud cover, trying to maintain formation, flying wing tip to wing tip, made for a high pucker factor."

You served well, true and without hesitation. I say to you in the words of the Apostle, Paul, written to Timothy. [2nd Timothy Ch. 4, verses 6 to 8.] "You (I) have fought the good fight. You have finished the race. You have kept the faith." You have done more and I quote from Stephen F. Ambrose's widely acclaimed book on WWII in the ETO, 'Citizen Soldiers."

"The Luftwaffe was without fuel. The allout strategic bomber assault on German refineries and other oil related targets had a cumulative effect that was devastating to the German army and air force...by the Spring of 1945. The Wehrmacht was out of gas. In and of itself, that justified the investment in four-engine bombers. The war could not have been won without them.

I am sure that it is altogether fitting that we toast here today with whiskey. You will remember our stops on the way to debriefing after the mission at the window in Doc Rapporte infirmary. Let me read again from Ambrose's book.

Lt. Raymond Murray, pilot, was 19 years old, "I was so young that with the passing years time has erased most of the bad things I'd seen. The only memories that I now have of combat missions are hours and hours of boredom inter-

rupted by moments of sheer terror."

"I talked to our flight surgeon, Capt. Jack McKittrick about this one day. He was a very nice guy. He said, 'That's why we give you whiskey, and that's why you're all so young. If you thought about it, you wouldn't fly combat."

"McKittrick saw to it that crews got liquor rations after a mission during debriefing, and it did a great deal to settle them down. It helped to relax them slightly from the horrors of a particularly terrifying mission that,

mission that, all too often, surpassed fiction. And I'll



Brothers, raise your glass in a toast to the 19 men left standing here. The men who made the ultimate sacrifices in Europe, those who since the end of the Air War in Europe have folded their wings, and the 275 men thought to be still standing, but not keeping in close touch with us.. We salute you! Salute!

"Here's to mud in your eye."

KC-135R Stratotanker assigned to the 6th Air Refueling Wing, 91st Air Refueling Squadron, at MacDill Air Force Base, Fla., flies a training mission over central Florida. The KC-135's

KC-135's principal mission is air refueling. This asset greatly enhances the U. S. Air Force's capability to accomplish its mission of Global Engagement. It also provides aerial refueling support to U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps and allied aircraft. Four turbofans, mounted under 35-degree swept wings, power the KC-135 to takeoffs at gross weights up to 322,500 pounds. Nearly all internal fuel can be pumped through the tanker's flying boom, the KC-135's primary fuel transfer method. A special shuttlecock-shaped drogue, attached to and trailed behind the flying boom, may be used to refuel aircraft fitted with probes

MacDill AFB, FL

MacDill (sometimes mis-spelled McDill) AFB is located eight miles south of downtown Tampa. Now an operational ase, MacDill has about 6,000 airmen and civilians on 5,000 acres, located on the Southwestern tip of the Interbay Peninsula on the west coast of Florida.

MacDill Army Air Base was named after Col. Leslie MacDill who died in a plane crash near Washington D.C. in 1938. Its first mission was training World War II airmen on B-17 and B-26 aircraft.

During the Spanish-American War (1898), Tampa, because of its strategic location, was chosen as a rendezvous point for troops heading south to help Cuba gain

independence from Spain. Approximately 10,000 of the 66,000 troops in Tampa waiting for ships headed to Cuba set up camp around what was then known as Port Tampa City, which bordered what is now MacDill AFB.

Flying operations at MacDill began in 1941 with the base, first mission including transitional training in the B-17 Flying Fortress. Following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, MacDill became a major staging area for Army Air Corps flight crews and aircraft.

During the war as many as 15,000 troops were stationed at MacDill at one time. Estimates of the number of crew members trained at the base vary from 50,000 to 120,000.

In 1996 the Air Refueling Wing marked the beginning of a new era for MacDill. The redesignation marked the addition of a KC-135R squadron and mission which expanded in 1997 with the add-on of EC-135 and CT-43 aircraft and missions.

Since the redesignation, Mac-Dill and the 6th Air Refueling Wing, have contributed to military operations around the world at locations including Istres, France; Ramstein AB, Germany; Soto Cano and Taszar, Hungary; Zagreb, Croatia; Tuzla, Bosnia; Incirlik AB, Turkey; and Al Kharj and Riyadh, Saudia Arabia.

And In The Bay Area...

Tampa is a major Gulf Coast city in Hillsborough County, on the west coast of the state of Florida.

According to the 2008 estimates, the city's population had grown to 340,882 making it the 53rd largest city in the United States.

Tampa is a part of the metropolitan area most commonly referred to as the "Tampa Bay Area". The four-county area is composed of roughly 2.7 million residents, making it the second largest metropolitan statistical area in the state, and the fourth largest in the Southeastern United States, behind Miami, Washington, D.C., and Atlanta.

The "Greater Tampa Bay" area has just over 4 million residents and generally includes the Tampa and Sarasota metro areas.

Tampa's port and international airport make it an easily accessible, popular destination in Florida. Its rich history mixes with its modern landscape, giving visitors and residents a medley of activities and attractions to choose from. Busch Gardens, various large museums, and the city's resident football team, the Buccaneers, are just a few of the major highlights. The area is rife with small towns as well, offering a glimpse into Tampa's history and diversity.



His unit received the Presidential Citation. After flying 62 missions he earned the Air Medal with 7 Oak Leaf Clusters and the European Theatre of Operations Ribbon with 8 battle stars.





81st Reunion Makes Headlines in Local News Media
