

2015 Reunion

Joint Reunion of the 451st and 455th Bombardment Groups (H) WWII
With other 15th Air Force Units
September 24th-27th, 2015

- The reunion includes the 451st, 455th, 461st, 465th, 484th and 485th Bomb Groups in order to keep our group a strong, viable size.
- Individual group dinners are planned for Friday evening. The 451st, 455th and 465th will meet together as one group and the 461st, 484th and 485th will each have their own group dinner.
- Saturday evening is the Gala Banquet including all Bomb Groups.
- Saturday guest speaker is Roger Locher, an F-4D Weapons Officer and Pilot who was shot down over North Vietnam in 1972. Locher spent a record 23 hair-raising days evading capture before being rescued and returned to friendly territory. Locher says he will consider it an honor to relate his story to our group. He is the nephew of 484th member, Dick Yunghans.

World War I Museum at Liberty Memorial (\$39 per person) – 9/25

This is the only Memorial of its type in the country and has been designated by Congress as the nation's official WWI museum and monument. The museum is extremely well done and nationally renowned. It offers a great insight into the war that many of our Bomb Group veteran's fathers fought in and illustrates that "some things just never change"! Atop the museum is the WWI Monument that was dedicated by President Coolidge and the Allied Commanders in 1921 in front of 150,000 people. The area surrounding the tower offers panoramic views of downtown Kansas City and the surrounding area. You can take an elevator to near the top of the 230 foot tall tower, although there are 45 stairs to get all the way up to the observation deck for breathtaking 360 degree views. We will have lunch in the Over There Café before returning to the hotel.

Harry S. Truman Presidential Library & Museum (\$39 per person) – 9/26

You will see first-hand how this humble and simple man from Independence, Missouri led our country and made some really difficult decisions after the death of FDR during the height of WWII. You will be amazed at the simplicity and unpretentiousness of the "most powerful man in the world". This is a great museum that our Veterans and wives will especially relate to. We will have lunch in the indoor atrium that overlooks the outdoor courtyard where HST's grave along with his beloved wife, Bess is located. We will then go the mile or so to view the Truman home from the outside, the home where he and Bess lived from the time they married until his death in 1972. A National Park Service Ranger will board each bus to give an overview of the home. Their home, although quite large by yesteryear's standards is remarkable in its simplicity and that of the surrounding residential neighborhood where the President took daily walks with no Secret Service protection (until the 1960s).

Steamboat Arabia (\$43 per person) – Sunday, 9/27

The Steamboat Arabia was a cargo and passenger steamboat that ferried supplies and people up and down the Missouri River, aka Big Muddy. This boat sank in 1856 and settled to a depth of about 45 feet of mud after the river channel changed over the course of time. It was discovered and a real treasure chest of ship parts and artifacts were retrieved. This is truly a fascinating museum and offers a great insight into the clothing, tools, kitchenware and many, many other items of life in the mid-1800s. We will have lunch in the museum's Atrium Café.

MUSEUM OFFICIALLY PURCHASES ROSIE'S OLD PLANT

YPSILANTI TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) — Rosie the Riveter's old plant in Michigan has officially avoided the wrecking ball.

Yankee Air Museum board chairman Ray Hunter signed papers Thursday making the aviation museum the owner of a 144,000-square-foot slice of the former Willow Run Bomber Plant, where Rose Will Monroe and other workers built B-24 Liberator bombers during World War II.

The signing ceremony represented the culmination of efforts to raise the \$8 million needed to save part of the factory for the nearby Yankee Air Museum's new home.

"The building is truly saved," said Michael Montgomery, a consultant on the fundraising effort.

Hunter, Montgomery and others associated with the Save the Willow Run Bomber

Plant campaign want to convert the factory and dedicate it to aviation and all the Rosies who toiled at similar U.S. plants to aid the war effort.

"We're very proud that we played a part in preserving" the plant, which "contributed so much to our victory in World War II," Hunter said.

Following the signing event, two Rosies unveiled the name and logo of the planned facility: National Museum of Aviation and Technology at Historic Willow Run.

"If we're telling the Arsenal of Democracy and Rosie story, this is the place to do it," said Montgomery.

He said \$5 million more is needed to "fill out the interior of the building" — to create the exhibits and infrastructure necessary to transform the edifice into a museum.


The facility in Ypsilanti Township, west of Detroit, was owned by the Revitalizing Auto Communities Environmental Response Trust. It took control of sites around the country left behind in General Motors' bankruptcy.

RACER Trust is overseeing the demolition of the massive plant. The section purchased Thursday would have been razed if Yankee Air Museum hadn't stepped in.

The Willow Run factory, which was built by Ford Motor Co. and featured a milelong assembly line, churned out one B-24 every hour and nearly 9,000 in all.

It transitioned to producing cars after the war ended and made them and parts for more than a half-century under the GM name.

In fact, the Fifteenth Air Force bombed the synthetic oil refineries at Oswiecim/ Auschwitz on August 20, September 13, December 18 and December 26, 1944. I flew as a sergeant tail gunner with the 781st Squadron, 465th Bomb Group, on the September 13 mission to Oswiecim.

It was a long haul and it took our Consolidated B-24s from their base at Pantanella, Italy, to the extreme end of their operating range. The squadrons and groups rendezvoused over Italy, then climbed with a full bomb load, all the way to the target. We climbed to 22,000 feet, reached the IP (initial point) and started the bomb run. At the appropriate time our bombardier dropped his bombs.

The German flak guns gave us a rousing welcome. A piece of flak struck my foot behind my seat another piece sliced the underbelly of the fuselage, went up to pierce the rudder control arm, and left a gaping one-foot jagged hole across the top skin of the fuselage. I could smell the cordite from the exploding flak bursts, and my tail turret's plastic dome shattered. We lost hydraulic fluid, but our pilot managed to get us back to Italy, landing with no brakes and lots of holes.

After that mission, I placed a piece of steel from a discarded flak suit on my turret seat. I had volunteered to fly extra missions in order to get back home earlier, but after Oswiecim I stopped volunteering. That mission was the only Oswiecim flight recorded in our 781st Bombardment Squadron history.

Perhaps, as the author explained, there

heard a word in any of our briefings about German concentration camps and gas chambers at Oswiecim/Auschwitz. While I only flew one mission to Oswiecim, my group flew nine missions to the Blechhammer South and North oil refineries, which were located near Cosel, Germany. They were tough targets and it was during one of these missions that I was finally shot down on Friday, October 13, 1944.
