

THIRD REUNION HUGE SUCCESS SAN ANTONIO PROVES TO BE GREAT CITY

National news was focused on the hurricane Gilbert, the Presidential race, and the Olympics, but in San Antonio our focus was on the '88 Reunion for the 781st Bomb Squadron and the first reunion for the 465th Bomb Group. And what a time we had. To those attending for the second and third time it was all expected, the outpouring of friendship and comaraderie. But it was a new experience for those attending for the first time and it was such a thrill to see them getting acquainted and emotional after all these years. A real joy to see an old comrade, to share a tory or remembrance. As we observed at the second reunion, it took little time to get reacquainted and into the swing of the reunion, but this time it took no time at all to see a familiar face and get involved in a conversation.

So, to begin at the beginning, for me it was on September 9th when I left home in my Airstream loaded with ten boxes of supplies and material for the reunion. I had not traveled by highway in this region of the southwest, so I had decided to drive. After a pleasant journey I arrived in San Antonio on Monday the 12th. I checked the layout of the hotel, etc. and Agnes and I had a relaxing dinner on the River Walk.

Tuesday morning as I was checking with the front desk I saw the first 781st man - it was Paul Durckel (Center photo, left). I recognized him instantly, the first time since I had seen him since March 1945. Paul was navigator on the McDaniel crew and later lead navigator. It was in this position that on March 22, 1945, that he flew his last mission. It was Vienna and he was the last man out of the lead plane and he served the rest of the war as a POW.

Later in the day many more arrived, here were many small gatherings in the lobby and for these men and their ladies the reunion was under way. I covered plans with the hotel in the morning and in the afternoon I met Gale Graham, group I & E officer, who drove me around San Antonio on some errands for the reunion.




By Wednesday morning the pace really picked up. Helpers like Ben Donahue were arranging for the hospitality room. Ben had to sweat out getting the hospitality room open since it was occupied and not scheduled to be available until 1:00. A little pressure on the hotel saved the day for Ben and soon some of the lobby gatherings quickly assembled in the hospitality room. I met Harry and Donna Carl at breakfast and we then met with the hotel to work on our

meeting rooms and the program.

O. J. Cowart, Jr. arrived in the late morning and began the set up for registration. O. J. and his wife Esther got broken into the registration in a very short time. We always try to open registration before the announced time, but it never seems to be early enough. What a crowd we had with nearly one-half sign-

ing in a day early!

At registration all were pleased to receive a pin with the group tail markings, black background with yellow markings. Richard Swanson had helped arrange for a local lady to sell a popular local item, bandanas, for half the regular price. She sold out, then with the help of her sister, worked most of the night to make more and sold out again very shortly the next day. Ruth Simmons liked them so well that she bought an

That evening many took a stroll to the River Walk area and enjoyed dinner along the river. It was a chance to relax and enjoy some of the local area before joining in on all the reunion activities. And after dinner further stories and drinks flowed in the hospitality room.

On Thursday morning I had a knock on the door at 7 AM and it was O. J. Cowart with a computer run on the previous days registration and cash accounting. O. J. had his computer in his room and knocked out the report instead of getting a full nights sleep. Then it was a full house for breakfast and there was no slowing down the rest of the day. In addition to the 781st we saw members of the 780th, some who had been there since Monday, 782nd members, and some from group headquarters.

A line was waiting for registration before O. J. could get open. Many helpers served their time at registration. It was good to see some wives getting their husbands to help out - like Stan and Alice Winkowski,

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

HISTORY BOOK

As those of you that attended the reunion know we are going to have one of the best history boks ever published. A mock up book was available in the hospitality room and was of great interest to everyone. On the questionaire during the reunion only one noted that he did not intend to order one. Orders began to be placed starting on Friday, and already over 100 orders are in. The price is \$35 per copy. If you have seen the mock up and are familiar with the cost of a book like this you will know that this is nearly half of the normal price.

This book will be a detailed day by day chronology of squadron activities. We have pictures of every air crew except R. C. Jones and pictures of most of the ground support units, plus many, many other photos of squadron activities, missions and men.

It will be a hard cover 8 1/2 X 11 book of at least 160 glossy finished pages to give the best photo reproduction. It will be published by Taylor Publishing Company, a national organization with lots of experience in printing military books and coffee table type publications. Checks should be made out to the 781st Bomb Squadron Association and mailed to O. J. Cowart, Jr., treasurer. We must have your order by December 15, 1988. The book will go to press in December and will be mailed out approximately February 1989. Do it today so that you and your family will have this lasting record of your war service. Some have ordered books for each of their children, etc. This book is available to anyone, not just association members. Costs for second printings will be prohibitive - this will be the only printing.

As you all know Harry Carl has been working on this book for the last two or three years and it is only through his dedication to the squadron, and men he served with, that we will have this lasting detailed account on the 781st Bomb Squadron. His computer and photography work has made the low price possible.




COMING UP IN NEXT ISSUE - A list of all those planning to attend the reunion, Larry Tiehen's story about his six weeks evading the Germans, and much more.



- DATES 11 to 15 September 1986
- PLACE Sheraton Inn, I-25 and North Academy Boulevard, Colorado Springs, CO 80918. The Inn is located one mile from the Air Force Academy's south gate and ten miles north of Colorado Springs on Highway I-25. If you drive, you will find an abundance of free, safe parking. Large empty lot next door for motor homes but no hook-ups. If you fly to Denver you might want to rent a car; it's just an hour's drive. If you fly to Colorado Springs there is free transportation from the airport to the Inn. The Inn has just completed a remodeling and addition, and the rooms are in excellent condition. It offers a spectacular, panoramic view of the Rockies includaview of Pikes Peak. There are many other attractions in case you want to come early or stay over, as the weather is beautiful at that time of the year.
- COSTS The Sheraton Inn is giving us special rates which are approximately 25% off their normal rates. Singles are \$45, and doubles are \$55 per day. The rates are guaranteed for three days before and three days after if you want an extended stay. And you get a full breakfast FREE! Meal prices are reasonable in general, both at the Inn and in the area. Our group meals will be about \$11 per person for Thursday and Sunday and the banquet will be \$18. No group lunches so you can select whatever you want for lunches. The registration fee of approximately \$25 covers the hospitality room, supplies, name tags, flowers, equipment rental and all incidentals need for the reunion including the cost of buses for the Academy tour. The above quoted meal prices include the 20% for tax and tip.
- PROGRAM A change due to the fact the Air Force changed the football schedule so that the Saturday game will not be at the Academy. Therefore, the followis our schedule;
 - Thursday Registration, hospitality room, with evening cocktail party and buffet at the Inn, followed by a short program.
 - Friday Tour of the Academy. Lunch at the Academy or in Colorado Springs.

 Afternoon tour of the Valley of the Gods and return to hotel by
 Four o'clock. Hospitality room and open evening for crew or section
 reunions.
 - Saturday Morning business sesson followed by programs and hanger flying the rest of the day. Lunch break for lunch at the hotel. Program to include a typical mission briefing, a professionally done slide presentation of the days at Pantanella, WWII combat movies, exchange photos and much, much more. Cocktails and banquet at the new, beautiful Cheyenne Mountain Inn.
 - Sunday Academy Sunday Services are at 9:00 o'clock and 11:00 o'clock for Catholic and Protestant. Protestant in the main chapel and Catholic on the lower level. After that, many places, including the hotel, offer Sunday Brunches. Afternoon program at the hotel at 2:00 o'clock. Evening cocktails and going away dinner at the NCO club at the Academy. Monday morning is breakfast and check out.
- DRESS Daytime; Casual. Evening: Men, coat and tie; ladies, cocktail dress.
 No formal attire.
- RESERVATIONS Fill out enclosed forms and send one to the hotel with your check and the other to me, or you can send both to me and I will forward.

HOW TO GET TO THE MENGER HOTEL

I-10 FROM EL PASO - After passing first interchange on outskirts of city move to left lane. Take exit that reads "Downtown, Left Lane." Continue 1 long block to Houston St. (hospital buildings on right). Turn left and continue through business section to Alamo street, staying in right lane. Cross Alamo street, and continue 1 block to Bonham street. Turn right and continue 1 block to Menger Motor Inn (fountain on right).

I-35 FROM DALLAS/AUSTIN - When nearing downtown take "Laredo/Corpus Christi exit and proceed to Commerce Street exit. At Commerce turn right, moving to right lane. Proceed about 3 blocks to Alamo street (Dillards Dept. store on right corner). Turn right and go 1 block (at end of Dillard's) to Blum street. Pass in front of Menger, turn right and enter Menger Motor Inn.

I-10 FROM HOUSTON - When nearing downtown move to right lane. Turn right where I-10 merges with I-37 and State 281. Proceed to Commerce street exit. Turn left under the overpass and move to right lane. Proceed about 3 blocks to Alamo street (Dillar's Dept. Store on right corner). Turn right and go 1 block (at end of Dillards building) to Blum street. Pass in front of Menger, turn right and enter Menger Motor Inn.

ABOUT THE WEATHER - In September the weather in San Antonio is hot with the temperature ranging from 90 to 100. Visitors should do their sightseeing before 2 p.m. or early in the evening. A walk along the river, 20 feet below street level, is not only much cooler than one along the streets, but is scenic and can be done leisurely. There are exit/entrance stairs from every street that crosses the river. Visitors susceptible to sunburn should wear head coverings and long sleeve shirts or blouses.

AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION - Limousine service runs every half hour and costs \$6 per person (about a 45 minute ride due to stops at other hotels). Cab is about \$15 (total for cab for one or more persons) and takes 15 minutes.

GETTING AROUND - An ideal way to travel in downtown San Antonio is by streetcar, authentic motorized reporductions of trolleys of more than 50 years ago. There are five different routes that travel the downtown and near downtown areas. The fare is 10 cents and the stops are at almost every street corner.

The route probably most used by visitors is the Alamo Plaza/El Mercado line, boarded southbound on Alamo Plaza, across the street from the Menger. The streetcar will circle Fiesta Plaza and make a long stop at El Mercado*. From there to City Hall and San Fernando Cathedral, to St. Paul's Square and back to Alamo Plaza.

*The El Mercado is patterned after the colorful market places of Mexico. A paradise for the astute shopper. Everything from pottery and jewelry to clothing. Several cafes and botiques line the walkways.

CAMPGROUND INFORMATION - Mission RV Park is now Yogi Bears Jellystone Park, 2617 Roosevelt Ave., San Antonio, TX 78214. Phone 1-800-558-2954 or 512 532-8310. A group rate has been negotiated by Wanda Dannelley (782nd BS). If you identify with the 465th Bomb Group, or your squadron, the rate will be \$12 per day instead of \$16. You should reserve early. They will put all the 465th in one common area in the park. They suggest not to follow their directions to find the park as Interstate 35 has some major work in the area. The easiest way is to drive to the southern leg of Interstate Loop 410 until the junction with US 281 has been reached. This is Roosevelt Avenue. Turn north on US 281 and drive to Southcross Blvd. The park then is located on the NW corner of junction US 281 and Southcross Blvd. (Next to an Airstream Travel Trailer Sales).

ALAMO, the crucible of Texas liberty, is across the street from the Menger. A visitor can spend a great amount of time in the building so it is a good idea to get a capsulized bit of information about the shrine beforehand. Admission is free.

RIVERCENTER - Take the walkway between the Menger and Dillards and in a few minutes you will emerge on one of the most scenic shopping malls in the nation. The river level (three levels in all) is the most unique. If you want to take a peaceful walk along the river to the Rivercenter, walk across Alamo Plaza and take the stairs leading through the lobby of the Hyatt-Regency and to the river. Directions are posted.

HERTZBERG CIRCUS COLLECTION - A collection of circus memorabilia, including a Tom Thumb collection and a miniature circus complete with big top tents. Located at 210 Market street, two blocks down the hill from Alamo street.

IF YOU'RE DRIVING OR BUS RIDING

SEA WORLD, world's largest marine park, is 16 miles west of San Antonio. Admission is \$15.95, plus tax., for those 55 and older, and \$18.95, plus tax, for the younger folks. Direct buses leave regularly from Sea World Center on Alamo Plaza, across from the Menger. Fare is \$1.90 and the ride takes about 45 minutes. Plan to spend a full day and prepare to walk a lot.

BUCKHORN HALL OF HORNS, is located on the grounds of the Lone Star Brewery, 600 Lone Star street. Garden-like grounds, large display of Texas wildlife as well as taxidermy of animals and marine life from all over the world. Free Beer! Admission is \$1.25.

FT. SAM HOUSTON - Entrance on Grayson street and New Braunfels avenue. It is the oldest military post west of the Missis sippi. First military flight took off and landed on parade grounds. Original fort, known as The Quadrangle, is located on Grayson street, and deer and peacock roam at will on the parade grounds. EATING PLACES - Alamo street is literally lined with eating places, mostly of the fast food variety. The San Antonio River Walk has many outdoor cafes and restaurants. Prices vary from moderate to expensive, but most establishments have menus posted along the walk. For Mexican cuisine the Casa Rio on the river is popular with the locals as is Mi Tierra in El Mercado. German food can be had at Schilko's Delicatessen, 424 E. Commerce street, a block from Alamo Plaza.
