I don't think anyone will disagree that we were in the BIG ONE.

Winston Churchill gave the Air Force credit for winning the war. But, according to Gen. Doolittle, we paid a heavy price. He commented that on our most dangerous missions, a quarter of our bombers failed to return. Six hours on oxygen, intensive cold, deafening noise, constant vibration and a one-in-three chance of completing their tour were the average prospects of our crews.

Over 50,000 U.S. airmen were lost in the air campaigns against Germany—the 783rd didn't lose its share—because we were the best—our pilots flew tight formations and our crews were crack shots. But we couldn't have reached the target and we couldn't have made it home if our planes had not been in top condition. Our flight line maintenance people were tops. Folks like Mike Magazine worked all night to get our shot—up planes back into mint condition. They had to plug away night—after—night—we got a day or two off after each mission. Since watching the flight line activities during Desert Storm, I have tried to acquire old training films to show at our reunion. No luck so far—but Floyd Gregory is now working on it—if they are available, Floyd will find them—when he retired he headed up the Jet Maint. Training Program for the entire Air Force.

Our Desert Storm victory made this old airman feel proud! But it was a "piece of cake" compared to our 783rd action. We were part of our country's most victorious period in history—the destruction of the

world's largest war machine, its Air Force, manufacturing facilities, oil fields and refineries, and its transportation and supply capabilities.

The 783rd was one of the best bomb squadrons in the Air Force--maybe the best! Remarkable, considering that we were just a bunch of 20 year old kids!

783RD BOMB SQUADRON REUNION SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS OCTOBER 7-10, 1991

Delta Air Lines has been selected as the official airline for our RE UNION They are offering special rates which afford a 5% discount off any Delta published round-trip fare within the Continental U.S.. For those passengers age 62 and older (plus one travelling companion) a 10% discount will apply. This includes Supersaver and other promotional air fares. All applicable restrictions must be met and all penalties apply.

What if you don't qualify for a discounted fare?

For those passengers not qualifying for any published discounts, a 40% discount will be offered on Delta's domestic flights or a 35% discount on Delta Connection Carriers (Atlantic Southeast, Business Express, Comair, and Sky West), for travel to the reunion. This discount will be based on the full non-discounted round-trip coach rates, and must be booked and ticketed at least 7 days in advance.





