

We had to pass several "relief tubes" or "ground mortars" that were stuck in the ground. The "five holer" was about 50 yards behind our tent. We could tell if the wind was in the right direction and it needed lime. I wonder what it would have been like today if we had women in our unit? Would the relief tubes on the planes have tow different types of funnels? Only kidding.

I use to go down to the flight line and help Pops and his ground crew work on Blue L or whatever. I loved airplanes and read all the manuals as I did the work. I passed the exam and had my spec number changed from 311 Gunner to 748 Gunner Engineer. George, why didn't I get put in for the extra stripe when we finished? I kept thinking I would get a surprise soon for my efforts. That will give you something to think about.

I'm glad that I had my little "Brownie" camera and only wish that I had taken more pictures. After the six or seventh mission I quit writing in my diary and stopped taking pictures. Al and I started drinking our double shots after the missions when we went to S2. Thank goodness I never did smoke my cigarette rations. I gave the 4 cigarettes that were in our wonderful C rations to the fellows on the crew that smoked and traded my PX supply to the Italians (not Mike) for eggs. I hard boiled the eggs in my steel helmet, got salt and pepper from out beautiful dining room (Ah, Oh, Col. Andrus) and had between meal snacks. Instead of lung cancer high cholesterol will probably get me.

In the next Latrine-O-Gram I will tell how I almost had to pay a Statement of Charges for a B-24 at Tunis.


