Our next L-O-G will have an extensive article about **GOLDEN JONES** and his kinfolk --- going back to the 1930's ----



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It doesn't seem possible that the Reno reunion is more than a month behind us. I have so many memories that are fresh in my mind. My wife, Kay, didn't feel up to making this one and my daughter, Peggy Friar came with me in her place. We arrived on Friday, a day or two early, and as we walked outside the Reno airport, who was sitting on the bench, awaiting transportation to the hotel, but Andy Anderson and his wife, Rosella! We hadn't been in the hotel long when Jim McCloskey called to give me some information that he knew would interest me. Before dark we had chatted with Jim and Peg McCloskey, Sam and Lynne Marie, Bill Douglas and his bride Catherine, and Clayton Van Dyke. And the reunion was still two days away! So it got better and better.

I appreciate the fact that at our business meeting, those present gave me this job by voting in the slate proposed by the nominating committee. We must have close to 400 people on our rolls, and only about 60 to 70 of the fellows were in attendance. So maybe I should tell you all who I am. I was the bombardier on Bob Swanzy's crew. We joined the 783rd in December, 1943 at We were shot down over Southern France on July 12, 1944. At that time Swanzy was a Captain and flight commander. He and our ball turret gunner, Lupe Montana, were killed in action that day. The rest of us evaded capture - actually we were with the French Underground, eventually flown out, returned to Pantanella - and on to the USA. Bob Thomas was our navigator, Bob Crabtree co-pilot, and Bill Nelson, assistant operations officer was flying with us. Besides Montana, our enlisted crew was Paul Hooge, Charles Cripps, Wilbur "Bob" Vaughan, Walt Wilson and Tom "Woody" Walsh.

I was very impressed by the job Andy Anderson has done as my predecessor, as I am sure you all are. I hope you also agree that the Armed Forces Reunions, Inc. people did a great job for us on the reunion. Several of our people also came forward to volunteer for various services. I hesitate to name names, lest I leave someone out - but I have to acknowledge "Gudo" Montgomery and Gladys for the floral centerpieces, the Einecker family for the golf day and dinner following and of course the always outstanding PX provided by Harry and Lola Fike.

There were some special highlights for me. Seeing my old boss, "Tito" Knaus and Frank Kara's co-pilot, Bob Haefner for the first time in 49 years was a thrill. I also met some very fine people for the first time. Wally and June Volkman and Connie and Afra Maffey had some kind things to say to me regarding something I had said in the business meeting, in one case, and at the banquet in the other. Wally also put me on the trail of a book about Ploesti which I have since located but not read yet. Wally tells me it was his first reunion. With the Maffeys - and with people like Ed Pereira, Jim May and even Jack Meyer, our new secretary It was a case of just getting to know them for the first time.

Burt Andrus told us in San Antonio there should be no more reference to categories of crews. Fine - and I want to elaborate on that a little in the next Latrine-o-Gram. I hope to stay in touch with over the next two years, and, God willing, to see a big turnout in Nashville in 1995.
