Speaking of Ploesti, and the defenses around it, I would be interested to hear what some of you "veterans" thought about the comparative dangers of bombing Ploesti versus Blechhammer. I got to each of those oil targets only once.

I received a fascinating magazine article from my bombing partner from Bombardier School. He flew with the 464th Bomb Group and this was a report of the mission on which his crew was shot down. It is called "Target Pardubice". It is eight pages, with pictures, and a lot of attention given to the 465th. It tells of Captain Clark's crew going down - apparently in Charlie Ellis' airplane. I will gladly send a copy of this article to anyone who requests it. I have already sent a copy to Dick Trimmingham who went down with Tom Clark and I have written to Russ Christianson with this offer. The report summarizes " it was probably one of the most successful missions flown by the USAAF in WWII.

I enjoyed the reports in the January L-O-G from Don Kay, Golden Jones, Orbin Rutledge - and all the others who sent messages. I hope others will feel free share their stories with us. I would like to be notified of any deaths, either of members or their families.

# WAR DEPARTMENT OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF STAFF WASHINGTON 25, D.C.


26 July 1945

TO: General Carl Spaats
Commanding General
United States Army Strategic Air Forces

- 1. The 509 Composite Group, 20th Air Force will delivery its first special bomb as soon as weather will permit visual bombing after about 3 August 1945 on one of the targets: Hiroshima, Kokura, Niigata and Nagasaki. To carry military and civilian scientific personnel from the War Department to observe and record the affects of the explosion of the bomb, additional aircraft will accompany the airplane carrying the bomb. The observing planes will stay several miles distance from the point of impact of the bomb.
- Additional bombs will be delivered on the above targets as soon as made ready by the project staff. Further instructions will be issued concerning targets other than those listed above.
- 3. Dissemination of any and all information concerning the use of the weapon against Japan is reserved to the Secretary of War and the President of the United States. No communiques on the subject or releases of information will be issued by Commanders in the field without specific prior authority. Any news stories will be sent to the War Department for special clearance.
- 4. The foregoing directive is issued to you by direction and with the approval of the Secretary of War and of the Chief of Staff, USA. It is desired that you personally deliver one copy of this directive to General MacArthur and one copy to Admiral Nimitz for their information.




